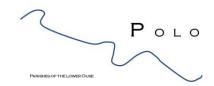
MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD (VIA ZOOM) ON MONDAY 16th JUNE 2025 (and the beginning of the POLO meeting originally scheduled for 19th May which was adjourned and re-scheduled due to low attendance, resulting from a clash with a full meeting of LDC.)

Present – Alex Pett (POLO Chair) (Southease Parish Meeting), Sue Carroll (Safer C7 Project), James Harrison (Newhaven Town Council), Stella Spiteri (LDC), John Scaife (Piddinghoe PC).

1.	Apologies for Absence	
	Apologies had been received from Cllr Cathy Gallagher (Telscombe Town	
	Council and Peacehaven Town Council) and Sarah Osborne (ESCC).	
	This meeting had been re-scheduled from its original date (19 th May) due	
	to a clash with a full meeting of LDC on 19 th May, which meant that many	
	members of POLO were unable to attend.	
2.	Changes to council representatives on POLO	
	Cllr James Harrison, who represents the Denton ward of Newhaven Town	
	Council, has replaced Shaun Boniface as the NTC representative on POLO.	
	James was welcomed to the meeting.	
	It was noted that Ken Whitehouse has now replaced Christine Moulder as	
	the representative of Kingston Parish Council on POLO.	
3.	Matters arising from the minutes of the meeting held on Monday 13 th	
	January 2025 where not covered elsewhere on the agenda.	
	SDNPA Local Plan consultation	
	Kingston Parish Council organised a consultation event for their residents	
	on the draft SDNPA Local Plan kindly invited councillors and residents from	
	other parishes to attend. This informative and helpful event took place on	
	26 th February 2025. Thanks to KPC for hosting this event.	
4.	Reports from councils on matters of potential common interest to other	
	POLO councils, where not covered elsewhere on the agenda.	
	South Downs National Park Gateway Sign for the C7	
	Piddinghoe PC have been trying to obtain a SDNP Gateway sign for the	
	southern end of the C7 (southern end of Piddinghoe parish), without	
	success.	
	The Safer C7 Project plans also include the proposal to locate a SDNP	
	Gateway sign at the southern end of the C7/Lewes Road. It was thought	
	that this would make sense, not least because the C7 acts as a gateway for	



	people arriving by ferry from France, and because the C7 and Lower Ouse	
	Valley are located entirely within the national park.	
	The C7 Project team had contacted Alex Pringle at SDNPA concerning this	
	matter because they wanted to include the costs within their application	
	for CIL funding as part of Phase 1 of the project (install village gateways).	
	Unfortunately, an extremely negative response had been received. The	
	SDNPA Head of Communications was reported to have re-iterated that	
	there is an established process for park boundary signage and these must	
	have members' approval. She pointed out that the location had already	
	been assessed previously, and it had not been possible to find a suitable	
	point to locate a 'boundary sign on this road'.	
	Alex Pringle had indicated that he had himself used Google maps to	
	determine that the only sites that look as if they might be able to	
	accommodate the smallest design are either 100m <i>before</i> the park boundary, which ESCC would not appreciate, or over 150m <i>after</i> the start	
	of the park, at a location that would likely affect the sightlines of residents	
	trying to leave their properties. He emphasised that the Safer C7 project	
	should NOT include a SDNPA 'boundary sign' in their CIL application and	
	should be aware that it was unlikely that it was even possible to locate a	
	boundary sign here, regardless of whether or not there was agreement to	
	install one.	
	It didn't sound as though there is any flexibility about locating the sign	
	anywhere except ON or very close to the actual SDNPA boundary, rather	
	than an SDNPA 'welcome sign' a little way inside the park, for example.	
	Sue Carroll reported that she had subsequently received some advice from	
	someone who had previously worked in SDNPA signage. They had said that	
	parish councils can fund the signs through CIL funding. This would by-pass	
	the boundary issue. It was recommended that Piddinghoe PC should	6.6
	contact Ruth James, the SDNPA person responsible for signage, and ask for	SC
	guidance on this matter. It was agreed that Sue would forward this	
	information to John Scaithes. (It had already been sent to Paul Bevan in May.)	
5.	Police Rural Crime Team – Parish Surgeries	
J.	As POLO secretary, Sue Carroll had written to Jennifer Edge , the Rural	
	Crime Team co-ordinator, requesting possible dates for POLO to hold a	
	joint surgery for councillors and residents, to be hosted by one of the POLO	
	parishes. A reply has been received, offering a number of potential dates,	
	but all the dates are in August. It was agreed that many councillors and	
	residents are likely to be away in August and that Sue should request some	
	dates after the school summer holidays have ended.	
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6.	A parish will need to take on the role of hosting the event. Up-dates on Road Matters	
0.	The Safer C7 Project	
	Steve Pearce has joined the Safer C7 Project team and is leading the CIL	
	application process. The project is benefitting from his previous	
	professional experience in local authority project planning.	
	An application for CIL funding to implement Phase 1a (village gateways) has	
•	been submitted to SDNPA. A decision is expected in the Autumn.	



An application for Lewes District Council CIL funding has also been submitted, to fund the following elements of the plans:

- 1b) new and improved crossing points.
- 2a) improved bus stop areas and access where needed.
- Some elements of 2b) new and improved footways: to the garden centre from the bus stop opposite Wellgreen Lane junction; to the Abergavenny pub from the end of the footpath from Northease.

The more complex crossing areas, at sites where there are also going to be changes to the layout of junctions, will be held over until phase 3. These more complex sites are at Cranedown, Wellgreen Lane (where PJA are suggesting there could be a zebra crossing), Rodmell, and Southease.

Consultants PJA had sent draft designs for the proposed interventions at Wellgreen Lane, Bodmell, Southease, and the priority working sites at

Wellgreen Lane, Rodmell, Southease, and the priority working sites at Rodmell and Northease.

There were no parish representatives from Kingston or Rodemll present at the meeting.

The Southease parish chair expressed his serious concerns about the draft design for Southease. Many of the proposed features seemed grossly inappropriate for the beautiful rural location; these included raised kerbs, red pavers, a zebra crossing (which would require lighting), a coloured 'implied pathway' down the lane towards the village. These concerns were shared by the Safer C7 Project team and had already been fed back to PJA, who had delegated this design to a designer who (it was thought) was not familiar with the site. A replacement design has been requested, along with the draft designs for the remaining sections of the C7.

It was suggested that once all the draft designs had been received, a 'workshop' should be held for a small number of representatives from each parish, with the consultants, to consider all the plans in detail.

The detail of the designs do not need to be confirmed until November. New guidance on rural road design being published by the SDNPA would be worth a look before the workshop; *Community Led Approaches to Traffic Solutions*, and its accompanying *Catalogue of Interventions*, SDNPA 2025.

The Safer C7 Team envisage that implementation of these first phases will take two years (from funding being allocated), with work on the ground starting in July 2026 and completed by 2027. Funding applications for the next phase would be made meanwhile.

The designs by PJA include the suggestion that bus stops should become information hubs for walkers, cyclists and bus users, perhaps with a map showing all the foot and cycle paths in the area. They also propose that there should be cycle racks located at the bus stops. POLO members did not think this would be practical or worthwhile – in terms of security for the bikes, or relevance to cyclists. Locating cycle racks within villages, e.g. near the church, village hall or pub, would be more useful. A cycle rack for each village has therefore been included in the LDC CIL application, since active travel is a priority for the council.

Project management for the implementation phases is currently under discussion. 20% VAT will be payable on all costs unless the project is



	managed by a public body such as the SDNPA, district council, or ESCC Highways.	
	The C7 project team may need to apply separately for grant funds to cover the costs of a suitably qualified and experienced part-time project manager. Both ESCC Highways and SDNPA have undertaken to provide advice and support for the project.	
	The Egrets Way – Phase 7 The landowners of land adjacent to the relevant stretches of road have all been visited. ESCC Highways, Sustrans and SDNPA are all actively involved.	
	Kingston Parish Council In addition to the vehicle width project, PJA consultants have been commissioned by KPC to look at the whole route from the bottom of Ashcombe Lane to the Wellgreen Lane junction, including the pinch points near the school where there are significant traffic problems at the start and end of each school day.	
7.	Local Government re-organisation Not much is known at this stage.	
8.	C7 Clean Up Weekend It has been suggested that this might also include 'tributary' lanes and footpaths next year.	
9.	AOB It was noted that local MP, James McCleary, is holding meetings for residents in the POLO parishes this summer.
